Besides, the form of affirmative action that they are practicing would not be forbidden under our policies."

Hudema: We passed 13 motions in 5 minutes at this super efficient (yet careful and considered) meeting!

2002-06/10 <u>QUESTION PERIOD</u>

Samuel: When will online registration be available? Why is the timetabling system down? [shrugs, general confusion and passings of bucks]

Clyburn: When will council see a report from Bill Smith re: Travel Cuts lawsuit? **Hudema**: [several minutes pass] Oh look; here he is now! **Smith (General Manager):** In the late 70s and 80s, we were part of the groups that owned Travel Cuts, then there was a transfer of ownership that was quite messy. Western filed a lawsuit and U of A, Queens and UBC joined. Discovery occurred late last year, rediscovery last week. Expect a trial date in fall or early winter. We can give a more complete report after we go to Western next week.

Schendel: When will we be able to see the handbooks? **Ross**: It's shooting [presumably photos] now. We'll have 18,000 in mid-August. It looks great and was below budget. Yay!

Kawanami: Why weren't Kings College and Concordia allowed into the Edmonton Student Alliance? **Sharma**: We wanted it to be just U of A, GMCC and NAIT to start. Plus, Concordia and Kings are semi-private and we have political policies saying that we don't support private institutions. However, they're private not-for-profit, so perhaps there's room for debate here. The ESA isn't doing anything right now that requires their involvement.

Smith (Councilor): How does the smoking and non-smoking policy fit in with the municipal bylaw? Ross: We'll look into this.

Smith: Would Ross like to comment on the "You Don't Know Jack" game played before the meeting? Ross: I placed third, due to trickery and deceit by my opponents.

Sharma (Councilor): What's up with the Funding Solutions Task Force? **Hudema**: We're presenting to admin. Students had no input in the initial review; we're trying to get a student presence.

Bolivar: Mr. Nader will receive a \$30,689 honorarium for his appearance; is that reasonable? Why are we paying for two people to travel and why is the cost so high, as our travel policy prohibits us from paying for first or business class tickets. How is this event to be promoted, as no advertising costs are included in the budget?

Hudema: Honorarium goes to three organizations that Nader is affiliated with; only a small portion goes to himself and the speakers bureau that arranged this. This is a high-cost estimate for travel; actual price should be much lower. Nader will not be flying business or first class. Mr. Nader will be speaking as part of the Eco-Conference, which has its own publicity budget.

Sharma (Councilor): Can you provide an example of deregulation being bad?
Hudema: Deregulation resulted in a 40% decrease in accessibility to low-income students at Guelph and a 50% decrease at the University of Western Washington.
Webb: What, if any, were the positive outcomes found in these studies?
Sharma: We're not here to discuss the merits of deregulation. I don't see any benefits in the area of Education. Supposedly, bursaries and scholarships would be increased, but this has not been proven.

Sharma: Let's get our national lobbying organization doing some national lobbying.

Kawanami: CASA doesn't have enough time to consider policy in advance, yet somehow they have time to develop a comprehensive policy before the FTAA is signed on Nov 13?

Clyburn: We are one of 23 members in CASA; we can't "direct" them to do anything. It would be more appropriate to take real leadership on this issue and bring an actual policy to the CASA policy committee.

Weppler: Who exactly is the "U of A SU?" The exec, this council, a committee? **Smith**: Whatever is appropriate under SU governance procedures.

Sharma: This issue would be better dealt with by CASA staff than by a formal policy.

Smith: Nader was a presidential candidate, environmental and consumer advocate, and pioneered the concept of Public Interest Research Groups. Funding from APIRG has been secured. We expect this to be a break-even venture.

Weppler: What if other sources of funding don't come through?

Smith: That would be very unlikely, but if it does happen, the money would come from the special projects reserve.

Williams: Who is the other person travelling with Mr. Nader?

Rajulu: Where are 700 people going to be sitting?

Kawanami: Is it double-dipping for this group to be accessing so many different SU funds? Who will be sponsoring this conference? Have you considered less expensive alternatives?

Hudema: Mr. Nader's personal aide will be coming with him. The presentation will occur in Horowitz, which has a capacity of 720. The SU is hosting this event and we are looking for other groups to partner with us, financially and otherwise. We looked into David Suzuki; he will be coming January 9th (pending Council approval). Other prominent speakers we investigated were booked at this time. Nader is a high-profile speaker, which will hopefully generate interest in the sustainability office as well as more potential partnership opportunities. There will be a \$10 ticket price, with the possibility of a fund for low-income students.

Bolivar: Budgets shouldn't have question marks in them; Council shouldn't be approving this with so much of the funding being uncertain.

Clyburn: Budgets are inherently estimates; they always have question marks in them.

Ross: We need to confirm with Mr. Nader very soon, which is the reason for some of the budgetary uncertainty.

Varga: Will the executive have the opportunity to speak with Mr. Nader about various issues while he is here?

Hudema: Mr. Nader will open the Sustainability and APIRG offices as well as

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			being available during a reception and dinner. There will be a lengthy question period at his presentation.
			Sharma (Councilor): If listening to Mr. Nader costs \$30,000, how much does it cost to eat with him?
			Ross : Mr. Nader comes with a free supper! This might also be an additional revenue source.
			Kawanami : Spending so much money on a speaker may reflect poorly on The SU when we are pleading poverty to the university and government.
			Sharma (Councilor): Will the source of funding be made public?
			Smith : The funding sources will be well publicized. We should be making decisions based on what is best for students, not what has the best optics.
